A project to raise youth and children awareness on solid waste sorting and recycling through art and performing arts







- The project was launched as a pilot in **2017**.
- It reached the objective of raising youth and children awareness on solid waste sorting and recycling through an art.
- 1233 refugee and vulnerable Lebanese students from grade 3 to 7 between the ages of 7 and 12.
- It helped fostering peaceful coexistence between the refugees' students and their Lebanese colleagues in public schools.
- It contributed, even though slightly, to reduce the impact of the solid waste on the environment in Lebanon.

Capacity Building of Art Teachers and Students:

- "Up-cycling for Hope" was launched with a 3-day workshop for art teachers, followed by environmental awareness sessions for students and the implementation of 2 main activities – mural art and "trash music" – in parallel with an awareness campaign.
- It built the capacities of the art teachers in the 7 targeted schools to foster a collective positive effort and a harmonious environment among the targeted students.



- Environmental awareness sessions for students took place in the 7 targeted schools and included:
 - interactive games
 - videos
- These sessions reinforced the communication skills between the students, especially between Lebanese and Syrian students.

MURALS: Creating large-scale murals with up-cycled material

- The project allowed students to reflect on environmental issues in a creative way through street art.
- They collected the "waste" material in a bin in order to construct a large-scale mural that artistically transformed the playground of their school to create a pleasant and joyful environment.
- They re-imagined their school artistically by joining their efforts in a collective action and engaged directly in the creative process.
- This participatory art drove the project success.



THE "TRASH ORCHESTRA" ACTIVITY

- "Up-cycling for Hope" put together an orchestra of students playing instruments made from materials they brought from home.
- The students learnt how to create their own instruments from waste.
- This activity gave children respect for the environment and music.
- It allowed them to develop new skills and build on their creativity.
- Trash turned into instruments and music into hope.

A School-Wide Awareness Campaign

 "Up-cycling for Hope" launched a School-Wide Awareness Campaign that created a whole-school culture and approach of sustainable practices.





- This campaign aimed to reduce garbage and increase recycling through an ongoing effort and foster environmentally conscious actions relating to the students' day-to-day lives.
- These changes in practices flowed through to the teachers and families and the community as a whole.

A closing ceremony was held in **Al Madina theater** on **December 19, 2017** to celebrate the achievements of "Up-Cycling for Hope" initiative. It included:

- A positive environment of collaborative efforts of young people fostered through an artistic initiative.
- The latter built at the same time the capacities of refugees and Lebanese students in terms of solid waste management and provided a tangible evidence that these can work jointly to produce something valuable out of waste.
- 7 targeted schools were committed to apply best solid waste management practices inside their premises.
- Targeted schools collaborated with the private recycling company ETS Daher to collect the sorted waste.

- Targeted schools reduced the load of solid waste collected by the municipalities.
- This reduced the financial burden on the municipalities in which the 7 schools are located (i.e. Municipalities of Beirut, Ghobeiry, Sin el Fil, Naameh, Haret Naameh & Choueifat).
- Physical presence in the schools enhanced the confidence of the refugee students and contributed to their protection due to increased referral capacity.
